Garden Heights Park

The Garden Heights area of the City of Altoona is the home of a new, all-abilities playground and park. Formerly the site of an old basketball and tennis court, the Garden Heights neighborhood was overwhelmingly in support of creating a children's playground and community park.



The result is the Garden Heights Park, designed to be accessible and fun for all ages and all abilities. The park includes a play booster for ages 2-5 and one for ages 5-12, as well as a swing set, benches and two large sway benches. There are also three standalone pieces- a drum circle, sensory dome, and shadow flower. The final piece is a 20 x 28 picnic shelter with four picnic tables. Its opening is scheduled for spring of 2024.

Altoona's Heritage

March is Greek American Heritage Month, also known as Hellenic Heritage Month, and this month we highlight:

Greek Heritage in Altoona, PA

Greek immigrants began to arrive in Allegheny County as early as 1890 and the first Greek immigrants to Altoona, PA arrived in 1891. Many were sailors from various Greek islands and, at first, engaged in manual labor. Soon they began businesses of their own, often as restauranteurs or confectioners. Greek immigration to our area peaked in the early 1920's.

Although the bulk of Greek immigrants remained in western PA with the steel and coal industries, the arrival of approximately 100 families to Altoona, along with individual Orthodox Christian immigrants from the Middle East, served as the beginnings of Greek communities in our City. These communities began holding joint church services in various homes and area halls. These joint services lasted until the end of the First World War, when individual churches began to emerge. Today, Altoona is home to several Greek Orthodox congregations and a Greek restaurant, The Athenian Café.

While today's Greek population in Altoona is very small, it remains significant in the western area of Pennsylvania. The contributions of Greek immigrants to the City's heritage and culture remain in the works of the railroads, the food festivals and the beautiful places of worship.
